It addresses issues in Nigerian languages, linguistics, literature, and culture. In this 5th edition, we offer six articles addressing syntax, sociolinguistics, phonology and applied linguistics.

The first article on "Nominal Phrases in Longuda" by Oluseye Olusegun Adegboye describes the syntactic structure and explores the functions of the multifaceted nature of nominal phrases in Longuda.

The second article "Socio-ethical appraisal of life after death among the traditional Ibibio" by Promise Akpan, Clement Eton & Enobong Lot, explores the belief system of the traditional Ibibio worshippers and the impact on the socio-ethnic life of their belief in life after death.

Nkereke M. Essien and Amaitem . Udo investigate the "Melody in Nigerian English: A Case Study of Students from the University of Uyo." The paper examines the rhythm and isochronism in the Nigerian English, drawing data from the University of Uyo.
